Latino Vote Project 2006

Washington State Democratic Party Activates Program to Reach out to the Latino Community

!Saludos/Greetings! Guided by the belief that we can strengthen our state and community when we work towards inclusion and encourage more participation in our elections, the Washington State Democratic Party 2006 Latino Vote Project (LVP) strives to listen to, serve and register Latino voters in Washington State. Latino's are the fastest growing minority group in Washington State currently making up 8.5% of Washington State's population. While Washington is a "Blue" state, the Latino population does make up an important bloc of votes, especially in swing counties and legislative districts. Specifically, 48,000 Latinos live in the 15th legislative district and 31,000 in the 14th LD.

As many of you already know, our own **State Representative Phyllis Kenney** has been an advocate and organizer for the Latino community for many years! LVP will help build on that good work!

The goals of the 2006 Latino Vote Project are:

- Connect with Latino voters on issues central to their community & the bedrock of the Democratic platform such as: Education, Affordable Health Care, Family Wage Jobs and Immigration Reform.
- Collaborate with organizations across the state in order to strengthen the voice of the Latino community as well as increase the number of Latino voters this fall.
- Encourage Latino leaders and activists to participate in the political system.
- Register 5,000 voters in Washington State.

The Latino Vote Project will highlight how Democrats in Washington State are fighting hard on issues important to the Latino Community. Washington Democrats are fighting hard against George Bush's plans to cut college assistance, working to protect access to quality healthcare in rural communities, expanding trading opportunities for the state's farms, providing job training and investing in our public schools to boost math and science skills. Democrats also support comprehensive immigration reform calling for a path for earned citizenship for undocumented workers who have been in the United States for more than two years, have obeyed all laws, who pay back taxes and a fine.

With offices around the state, the LVP is actively attending community events to register voters and educate the public about pending election law changes including the shift to a vote-by-mail system in most counties. In addition, LVP is working with organizers across the state to identify and develop Latino leaders and activists to help increase overall Latino voter turnout. The State Democratic Party has invested resources in this effort to ensure that we reach out, connect and turnout the Latino vote this year.

In Case You Missed It... Life in the Fabulous 46th!

The agenda for the September meeting of the 46th District Democrats included a proposal to increase the District's dues, a visit from King County Chair Suzie Sheary, endorsement of ballot measures, and the allocation of campaign contributions.

Chair **Scott White** reported that 141 PCOs were on the September 19 primary ballot. He commented that the PCO elections actually mark the start of activities for 2007 and the 2008 presidential election cycle.

Chair **White** explained the rationale and answered questions about the Executive Board's proposal to adjust the District's annual dues. Dues have remained the same for over 10 years, and membership dues in the 46th LD have been lower than a majority of the other LDs. Members voted to raise the dues, effective October 1, 2006, as follows:

Donna Boysen was introduced as Deputy Treasurer. Treasurer **Gail Chiarello** reviewed projections for expenses for the next four months. If the income from dues and the holiday party comes in at previous contribution levels, the 46th should have about \$5,300 at the end of 2006.

Suzie Sheary, chair of the King County Democrats, thanked the 46th District, our elected officials, and **Dean Fournier** and **Sarajane Siegfriedt** (46th District platform committee co-chairs) for their work in the party. Sheary has been active in working to improve the platform process used in 2006. She reported that several Democratic candidates currently are leading in areas in the county that have elected Republicans in the past. In response to a question about outreach to Asian voters, Sheary responded that the County currently is working on Hispanic and Asian outreach programs. A brunch event is planned on October 7 on the Spirit of Washington train. Representative **Jim McDermott** is scheduled to speak at the Labor Temple two weeks before the November election. He will talk about messaging and "how things are going in Washington, D.C."

After hearing speakers and discussing various ballot issues, the group made the following **endorsement** decisions:

Seattle Initiative No. 91 (approve or reject a measure that would require the City to receive a return "at or above fair value" for any future taxpayer investment in Key Arena or any other facility leased to for-profit professional sports teams)—**Take no position**

Seattle "Bridging the Gap" Transportation Levy (approve or reject measure to assess property owners 38 cents for every \$1,000 of assessed value for nine years to fund improvements to local streets and bridges)—**Support**

Seattle Referendum No. 1 (approve or reject Seattle City Council Ordinance #121952, which concerns licensing and regulating adult entertainment)—**Take no position**

King County "Transit Now" Measure (approve or reject authority to assess a one-tenth of one percent sales tax to allow Metro Transit to increase bus service an estimated 15 to 20 percent systemwide over the next 10 years)—**Support**

Chair White thanked County Council member **Bob Ferguson** for his work on the Council on this issue.

At its September meeting, the Executive Board recommended that \$2,300 be allocated to seven candidates. A lengthy discussion followed, including comments supporting both a smaller and larger cap. The body approved the following donations:

- Sen. Maria Cantwell \$500
- Sen. Ken Jacobsen \$500
- Rep. Jim McIntire \$300
- Rep. Phyllis Kenney \$300
- Susan Owens, St Supreme Ct \$500
- Darcy Burner, 8th Cong Dist \$200
- NO on I-933 \$300

Chair White commented that these donations represented a very sizeable contribution for a grassroots Democratic organization and that the membership should be proud of their ability to provide this level of support to endorsed campaigns.

46th State Party delegates **Janet Miller & John Webber** reported that the Washington State Democratic Central Committee would meet September 29 and 30 in Tacoma.

Chris Covert-Boulds reported that King County plans to propose closing the North Seattle Public Health Clinic near Northgate, the associated Dental Clinic at Lake City Way, and the Northshore Clinic in Bothell. A resolution to oppose these cuts will be considered at the October meeting.

Members were urged to support Peter Goldmark's Congressional campaign in the 5th Congressional District and Darcy Burner's campaign in the 8th Congressional District by doorbelling or giving money.

“Democrats are Great in Washington State. We are the Democrats and We Organize.”

This was the battle cry we heard from our state party chair, **Dwight Pelz** at the recent meeting of the Washington State Democrats Central Committee held in Tacoma. “We are not just a party of 24/7, but a party of 24/2. We are forwarding our messages, causes, candidates and initiatives for 24 months every 2 years. Odd numbered years are for reflection, planning and party building. Even numbered years are for campaigning and party building. The day after we re-elect Maria Cantwell, we will begin the reelection campaign of Chris Gregoire.”

The quarterly meeting of the state committee was filled with encouraging reports, inspiring messages and the finishing up of many loose ends left from our state convention last summer.

The Coordinated Campaign is running very smoothly statewide and is clearly the strongest we have ever had. We currently have 53 organizers in the field in 13 different offices around the state. The results are evident with the great showings in the primary made by **Maria Cantwell, Darcy Burner, David Goldmark and Richard Wright**, as well as very competitive State House and Senate candidates. The Latino Vote Project is up and running with staff, funding and enthusiasm.

We heard from our Democratic Nation Committee members about their recent board meeting. At our **Howard Dean’s** urging, the national party is running a 50 state program. He has been adamant about our party being competitive EVERYWHERE with a plan of “No Election Left Behind.” There are changes afoot in the timing and locations of the kick off of our Presidential Nomination process. The final rules have not been set, but we do know that Iowa and New Hampshire will no longer have the strangle hold on the process. Stay tuned for announcements about these changes.

The bulk of the Central Committee Meeting focused on the resolutions left over from the state convention in June. For those of you who were at that meeting in Yakima, you remember there were an enormous number of resolutions put forward and not nearly enough time to resolve them. Since that meeting, the Resolutions committee has met to make recommendations about these.

With few exceptions the body relied heavily on the report of the Resolutions Committee which had studied each resolution. Each resolution came with background of its origin, status to date and recommendation from the committee. If the

recommendation was anything besides Do Pass, it also came with an explanation of this recommendation. Given that there were nearly 300 pages of resolutions and over 180 individual issues to debate, this was an efficient and respectful way to handle our work. (Anyone interested in viewing the notes of these resolutions should contact either John or Janet and they’d be happy to share them with you.)

Among the resolutions considered, a few of the most notable that passed were:

- Res# 142 - Opposing Drilling in Arctic Nat’l Wildlife Refuge
- Res# 145 - Opposing Using Hanford for a National Radioactive Waste Dump
- Res# 183 - On Not Militarizing Space
- Res# 219 - Keeping Residential Habilitation Centers Open
- Res# 220 - Medical Use of Marijuana
- Res# 230 - Supporting Marriage and Sexual Orientation Equality

Of course, we are Democrats, so there were a few issues that we wanted to debate! One issue that was given time and speakers addressed the issue of representation of the state central

committee. This resolution, 116, called for the convening of a task force to research and make recommendation to address vulnerabilities in our current structure. While both of your state committee people voted for this resolution with the thought that a study is a study, not policy, the motion failed by an almost 2-1 margin.

One issue that was not debated, because it was withdrawn from

consideration, was the Young Democrats proposal for a charter amendment to allow YDs regular member status on the Central Committee. Before the meeting there had been quite a bit of lobbying, phone calls and emails from both sides of this debate. We sought input from the 46th membership about this issue and did receive a bit. Expect this issue to come up again when the YDs feel they are closer to being able to win the vote.

As always, we are here to represent you. It is an honor and a responsibility we take seriously. Please let us know if you have any issues or concerns.

Democratic Leaders Stand Up for Working Families at Wake-Up Wal-Mart Events Across the Country

This summer, **Wake-Up Wal-Mart** campaign launched a nationwide bus tour with stops in 19 states and 35 cities over 35 days. The response went well beyond all expectations. From its beginning August 1st in New York City to its grand finale on Labor Day in Seattle, the "Change Wal-Mart, Change America" bus tour attracted capacity crowds of union members and community supporters. By the end of the tour, Wake-Up Wal-Mart had signed up more than a quarter million people to join the campaign to change the way Wal-Mart does business.

Strong Support from Democratic Leaders

Prominent Democratic leaders joined the crowds at many stops on the tour. In Pittsburgh, former **Senator John Edwards** spoke to a crowd of 500, and called on Wal-Mart to provide affordable health care and living wage jobs for its employees. In Connecticut, both **Senator Joe Lieberman** and **Democratic nominee Ned Lamont** made appearances at Wake-Up Wal-Mart events. And in Iowa, a number of potential Presidential contenders spoke up and took a stand, including **Senator Joe Biden** of Delaware, **Governor Tom Vilsak** of Iowa, and **Governor Bill Richardson** of New Mexico.

All of these leading Democrats echoed similar themes: Living wage jobs. Affordable health care. Corporate accountability. Responsible development. And in city after city, the overflow crowds responded enthusiastically.

Grand Finale at Seattle's Town Hall

The bus tour had its grand finale here in Washington State. A standing-room-only crowd packed Seattle's Town Hall at 6:00 pm on Labor Day for the event. Local Democratic leaders including **U.S. Senators Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell**, **King**

County Executive Ron Sims, and **Congressman Jim McDermott** spoke to the diverse crowd of union members, community supporters, Democratic activists, environmentalists, and others. "It's really important that people understand our living wages are falling now and many people are struggling -- losing health care, losing pay," said Senator Murray at the event.

After a detailed presentation by Wake-Up Wal-Mart staff on the company's negative impact on our economy and communities, the evening ended with the presentation of an award to Citizens for a Better Mill Creek, a local group successfully fighting to block a planned Wal-Mart Supercenter in their community.

Change Wal-Mart, Change America

As the "Change Wal-Mart, Change America" tour showed, a powerful and broad-based coalition of union members and allies is emerging. Together, we're building the strength we need to take on a company that's devastating our communities, burdening our health care system, and eroding our standard of living.
